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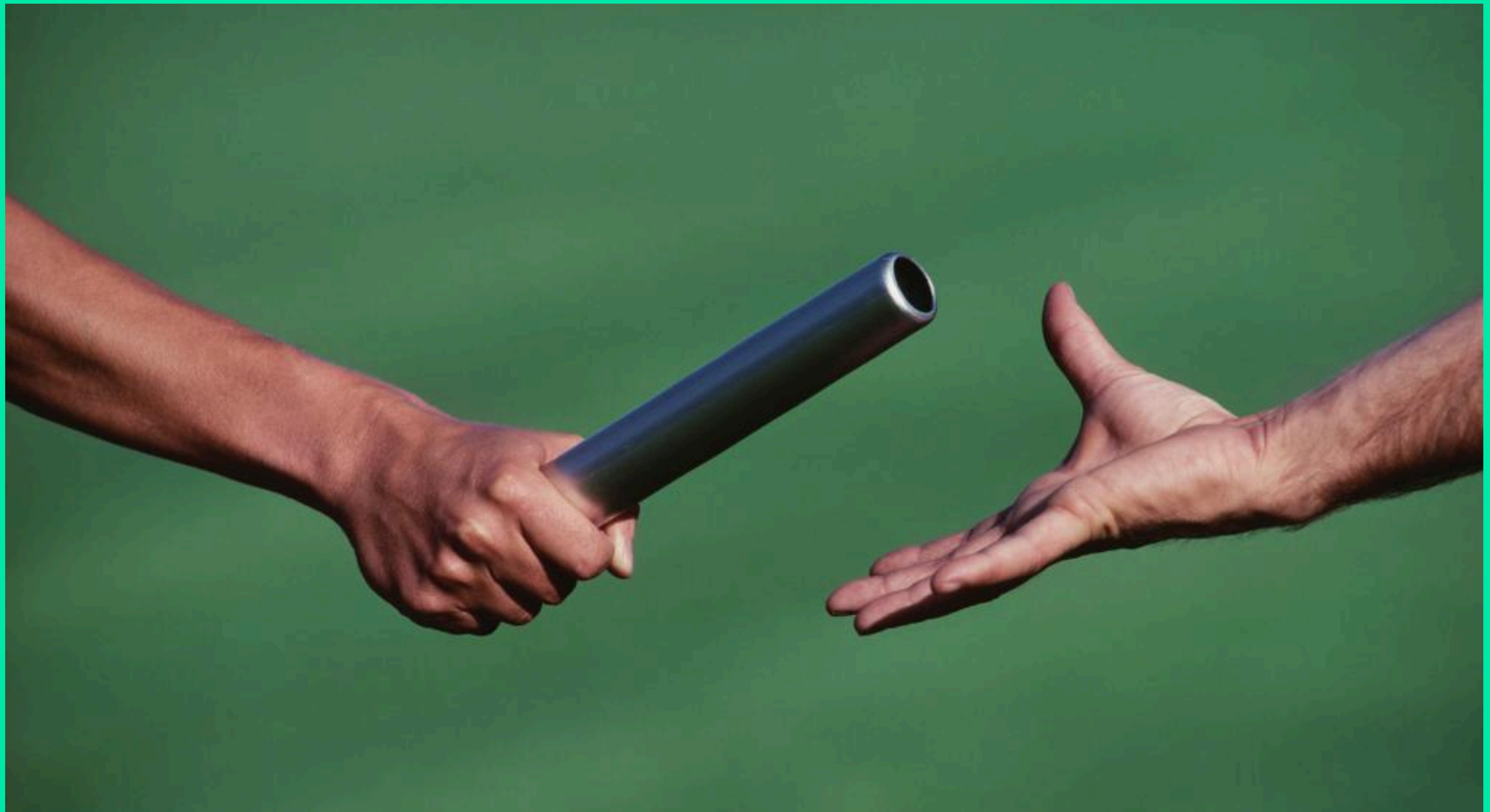

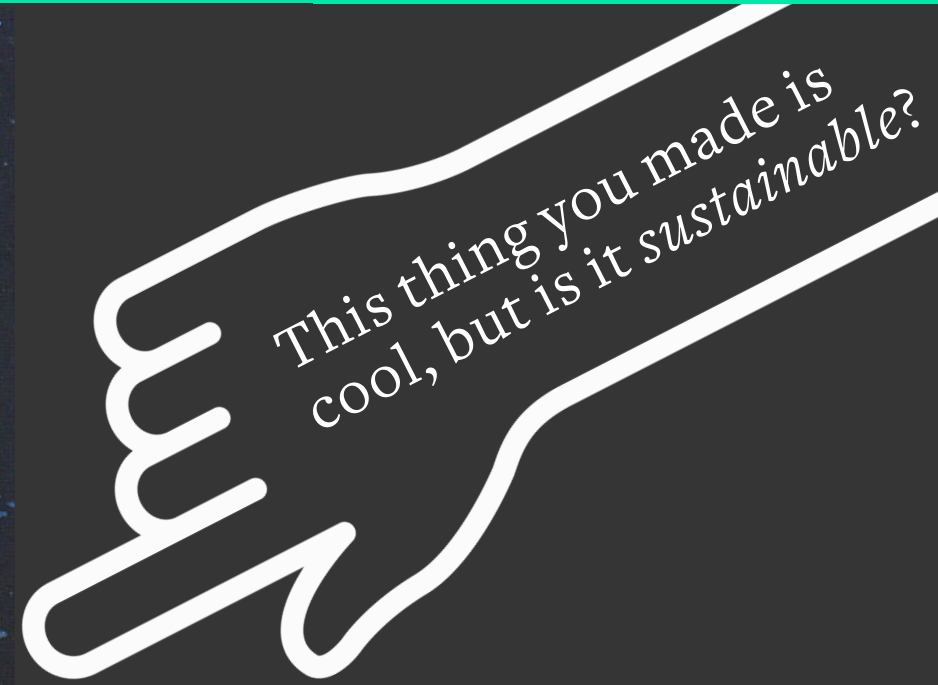

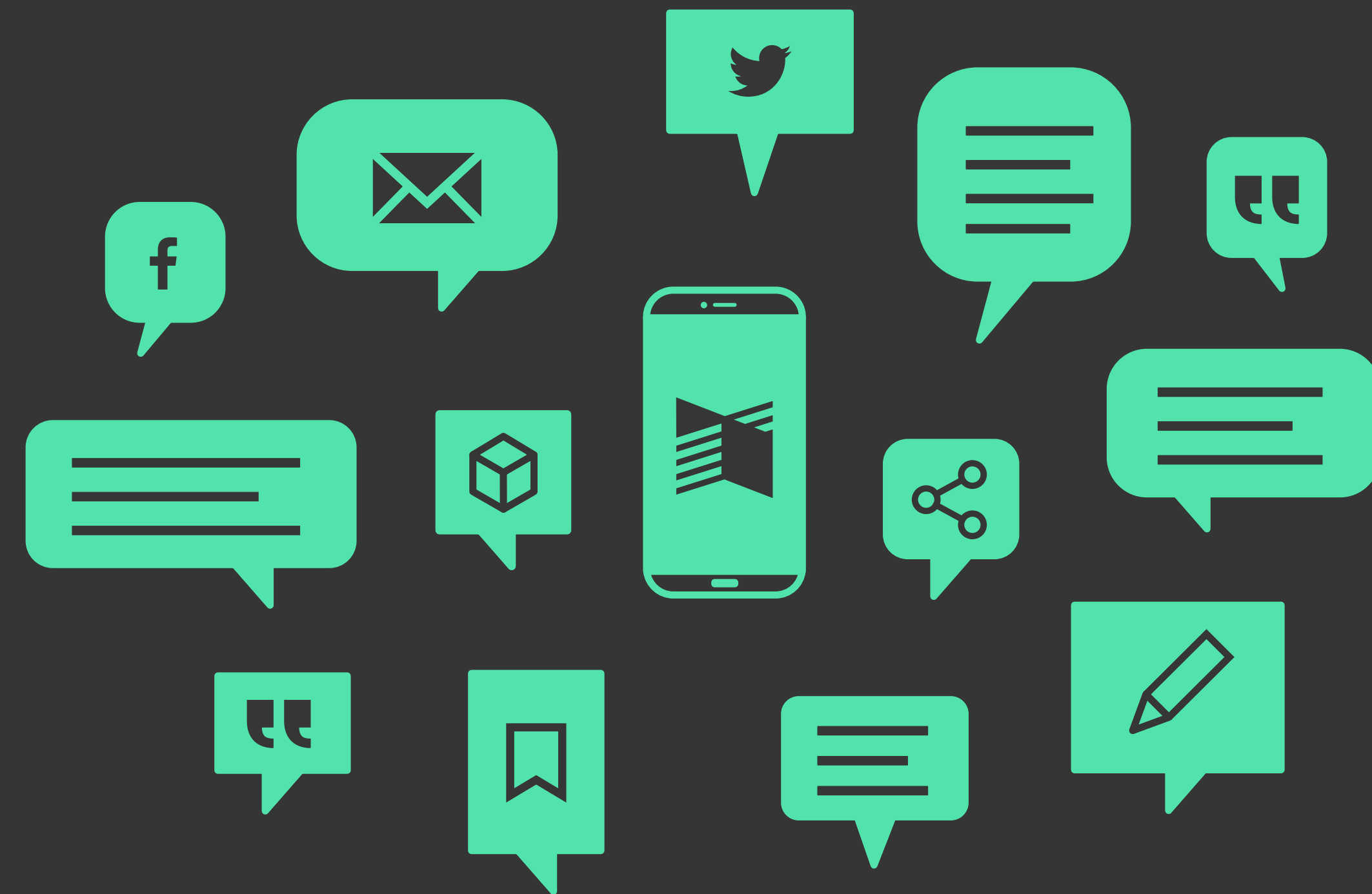

Odds are stacked against platforms becoming sustainable.

- We have a (relatively) small user bases.
- There's an awful lot of competition.
- Our projects get less fun over time.



**There are development strategies
we can use to improve those odds.**



Include Developers In Community Building

- Ensure your developers are engaged with your users.
- Avoid hired guns (internal, external) or make sure they have a real stake (in addition to \$).
- Embrace open development infrastructure.
- Ask developers to communicate publicly.
- Send developers to conferences.



Write Sustainable Code

- So much time & money goes into maintaining, patching, and fixing software.
- Reduce those costs by writing code that's less expensive to maintain.
- Invest early in:
 - Automated testing (unit tests, acceptance tests, integration tests)
 - Automated packaging (reduce the cost involved in releasing new versions)
 - Automated deployments (if hosting is a revenue stream, increase your profit margins)
- Defined, streamlined, documented dev. practices.

Don't Act Like a Startup.

- Technical debt is the **platform-killer**.
- Startups move quickly and accrue technical debt because if they find traction, they expect funding to increase over time. They can afford to fix things later.
- Funding for projects like Manifold is the inverse of the startup. We receive our largest investments early and investment likely diminishes over time. With luck, we end up with a consistent, small revenue stream.
- Deferring technical debt will vastly reduce the platforms ability to survive, let alone innovate, post-grant.

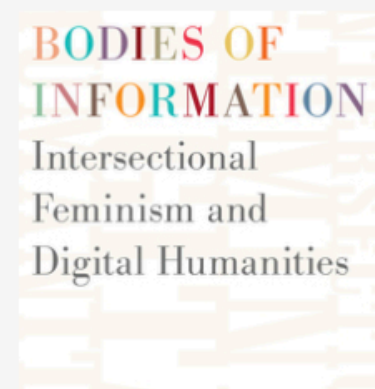
Welcome to the online home for *Debates in the Digital Humanities*, a hybrid print/digital book series that explores debates in the field as they emerge.

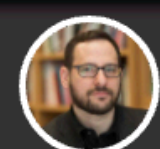

What matters in 2019?

On the surface of things, not much. In the United States, we have seen “fake news” take the place of informed reporting, “free speech” replace equal protection, and personal profiteering vault a chaos agent into the role of commander in chief. There he remains, secured by a welter of corporate interests, conservative media moguls, GOP enablers, and a vocal minority of the U.S. citizenry who find the rhetoric of racism, sexism, xenophobia, and generalized vitriol more appealing than the aspiration of a more perfect union. Events that only a few years ago seemed impossible—the intentional destruction of the nation’s social safety net, open rallies of armed white supremacists, and even the prospect of nuclear war—have become part and parcel of our daily lives.

What is the role of the digital humanities in the charged environment of 2019, and how can digital humanists ally themselves with the activists, organizers, and others who are working to empower those most threatened by it? Having spent nearly a decade immersed in the *Debates in the Digital Humanities* series, and even longer in the field, we are convinced that digital humanists can contribute significantly to a larger technically and historically informed resistance. By enabling communication across communities and networks, by creating platforms that amplify the voices of those most in need of being heard, by pursuing projects that perform the work of recovery and resistance, and by undertaking research that intervenes in the areas of data surveillance and privacy, the “artist-theorists, programming humanists, activist-scholars,

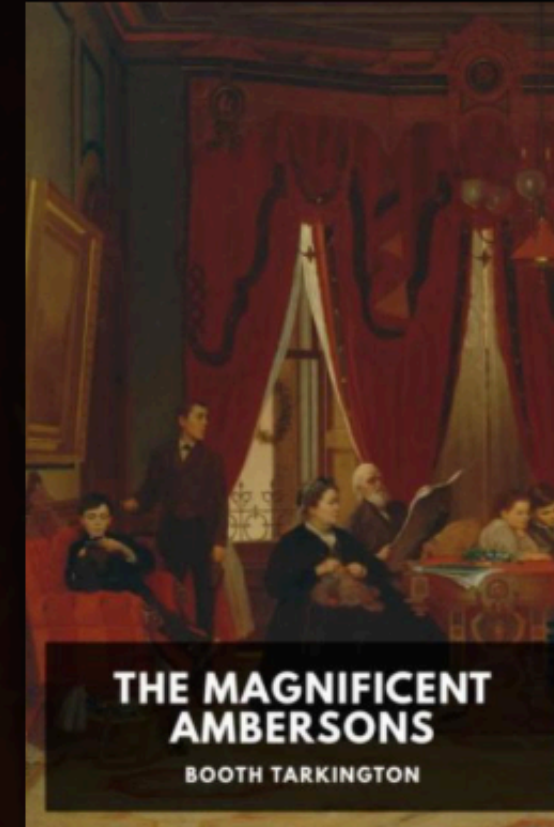
